The Winners Take All Community Read gets rave reviews. Families and educators have *always* given it the highest marks on the feedback forms. Families are happily surprised at how much fun they have sharing a book with their "older" children (kids in grades 3-5) Educators love it because it's a fun, book-centered event.

In a nutshell, everyone reads the books ahead of time and then attends a school sponsored family discussion with the author Fred Bowen.

Below, you will find a timetable for sponsoring the program, helpful templates, and sample announcements and press release.

NOTE: This game plan can be adapted to serve any Community Read with any book and author. Fred lives near Washington DC. You may want to work with an author close to where you live to save on travel cost!

The Winners Take All Community-Read Game Plan

Before you begin

- 1. Think about the culminating event, which is the school-sponsored family discussion. Some things to consider.
 - Decide whether to supply the books for free to families. If you are going to supply them for free, you make want to seek grant money from local or national organizations.
 - Decide whether to have light refreshments or dinner. Either way works well. Providing dinner requires more planning, which is something to consider before taking the plunge. One school had sandwiches from Subway and litres of soda. Pizza works too.
 - Decorations (and door prizes) for the family discussion are not really needed the event truly is fun enough— but if you have an enthusiastic PTA that enjoys making events more festive, you may want to contact your PTA.
- 2. If you would like to consider having the event covered by your local paper or TV station, there is a sample press release at the end.
- 3. Consider ways to promote the event. Families *always* love the Winners Take All Community Read (truly, no exaggeration) when they attend, but getting them to sign up can take some doing. To pull in as many families as you can, here are some ways to promote the event. (You can pick and choose - they are meant to be helpful, not overwhelming!)
 - Create bookmarks with the date and time of the event (see sample below).

- Get the PTA invested in the event. (It will lighten your tasks and beef up attendance.)
 - 1. Ask the PTA to help with the evening family discussion event serving refreshments, checking in families, putting up decorations. Have the PTA assign some "jobs" to dads as a way of encouraging their attendance.
 - 2. Contact the editor of the PTA newsletter to ask about the deadline. See sample copy on the last page.
 - 3. Put an announcement (and reminders) on the PTA listserv. See sample copy below.
 - 4. Ask the PTA president to mention it at the PTA meeting.
- Get teachers onboard. Ask them to remind their classes. There is also a Classroom Guide for teachers who want to read the book aloud to their classes. That's a long shot for today's busy teachers, but the guide is on Fred's website: www.fredbowen.com
- Contact the school website person to put a notice on the website.
- Include the event on the school's morning announcement. See sample copy on second to last page.
- Announce the event during the children's media center specials.
- If you have a school newspaper, have a student reporter call Fred Bowen to interview him.

Week one (which begins 5weeks before the family discussion date):

1. Invitation letters go home. See sample below.

2. Order books to have on hand when the registrations come in. Books can be ordered from us. (Contact Peggy Jackson at peggy@fredbowen.com). We will send a box of books to you so that you have books on hand to distribute as orders come. On the evening of the family discussion, you will return the unsold books along with one check made out to Fred Bowen for the books that you sold to families. *Tip: Don't worry about keeping track of how many books you sell; you can just subtract the unsold books from the total sent to get that figure when you need to.*

Week Two:

- 1. Collect the registrations, and distribute the books along with confirmation form (it's in the form of a bookmark that gets tucked in the book). See sample below.
- 2. If the registrations seem low in number, consider sending home a reminder notice about the event. You may also want to mention it on the morning announcements (see sample announcement below) and when the children come in for their library special.

Week Three – Week Five:

1. Everyone reads the book on his or her own. (Even better: some families will read it aloud together.)

2. Doublecheck about the reservation for the room (gym/cafeteria/library) and confirm the refreshments arrangements (PTA?)

Day of the event:

- 1. Check the room setup. Is a microphone needed? (Fred's preference is not to use a microphone unless it's truly needed.)
- 2. Have one check(s) ready for Fred's fee and books sold to families. Make checks to Fred Bowen.
- 3. Print the Discussion Questions(to help jumpstart the small-group conversations). They are printed below and also available online: Go to: <u>www.fredbowen.com</u> and click "Community Read" in the menu bar and scroll down to the Questions links.

Sample Schedule: 7:00 pm – 8:30 pm

(We can easily accommodate an earlier start time, just let us know.)

- [If you are planning to have dinner, it could be served from 6:30-7:00]
- 7:00 –7:20: Fred talks about why he wrote *Winners Take All*. (It's a very interesting story involving his beloved Boston Red Sox).
- 7:20 7:40: Families discuss the book together using the Discussion Questions card on their table to get the conversation going. Fred moves from table to table and joins in the discussions.
- 7:40 8: 00: Fred wraps up the evening and invites families to share some of the highlights of their discussions. He also takes questions. This is a very lively and interactive part of the evening.
- 8:00 8:30: Fred will sign the children's copies of *Winners Take All*. If you would like to have a book sale and book signing of Fred's other titles, we can arrange that. Just let us know.


